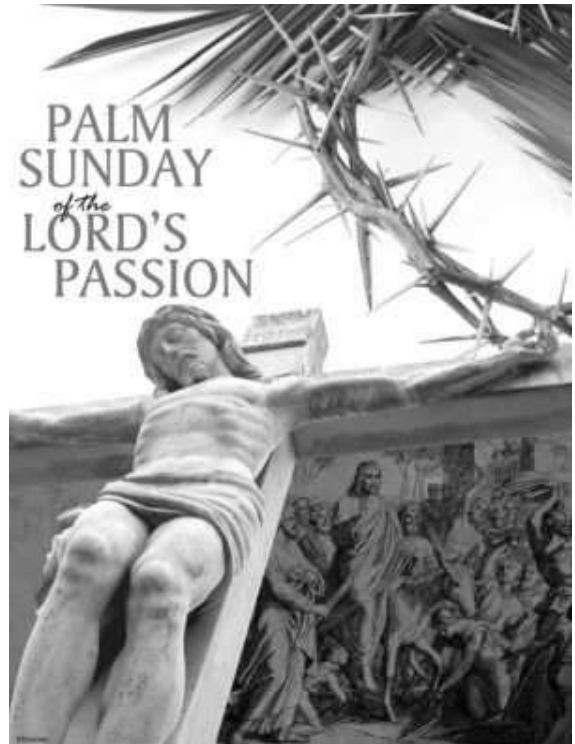

Read the reflection about the anticipation of Holy Week and discuss the “Ponder and Pray” questions and prompts, thinking about how Our Lord is calling you to act. Then consider the challenges of the “Live It” section, have fun with the family activities, and dive into the *visio divina* prayer exercise.

The Agony and the Ecstasy of These Days

Holy Week is a journey suspended between sorrow and hope, when the weight of the Cross looms heavy, yet the promise of Resurrection whispers just beyond sight. We walk with Jesus as he enters Jerusalem to cries of “Hosanna,” knowing these voices will soon shout, “Crucify him.” We follow him into the Temple, where zeal consumes him and the tension with religious leaders escalates. We witness the intimacy of the Last Supper, where Judas slips into darkness, leaving an unsettling void. These days draw us into the reality of sacrifice, obedience, and redemption.

Imagine walking with Mary through these events. Picture the joy in her eyes as the crowd celebrates Jesus, but also the silent anguish she carries, knowing what lies ahead. Sit with her at the Cross on Good Friday. Her sorrow is tangible, yet her faith remains steadfast. “He will rise,” she whispers with certainty. Now, on Holy Saturday, be with her as she waits in stillness by the sealed tomb. Feel the weight of absence and see the flicker of hope she guards deep within her heart.

This week asks us to hold grief and joy together, to trust that in the deepest darkness, light already is breaking through. Like Mary, affix your gaze on Christ. Let his Passion teach you about God’s boundless love, and let the anticipation of Easter stir a renewed faith in you. The tomb is not the end—his Resurrection is coming.

Ponder and Pray

- As you enter Holy Week, what emotions rise within you—joy, sorrow, or perhaps both?
- What would it look like for you to walk intentionally with Jesus each day of this sacred week?
- In what ways can Mary’s quiet strength and presence guide you through the tension of this week? Reflect on her emotions and experiences during this week.

Live It

This Holy Week, find a way to reflect intentionally on the duality of sorrow and joy. Each evening, light a candle as a reminder of Christ’s light that shines in the darkness. Pray with Scripture or attend the services of the Triduum—Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil. Consider journaling your thoughts, emotions, and prayers each day, asking Mary to guide you through the heaviness of the week toward the joy of the Resurrection.

Visio Divina

Take a moment to imagine Mary following behind Jesus as he enters the gates of Jerusalem. As she moves through the bustling crowd, she remains prayerful, observing everything with the quiet attentiveness of a mother’s heart. What might it have felt like to walk in her sandals, witnessing the joyful praise for her son, knowing the difficult path that still lay ahead? As you enter into this meditation, ask the Holy Spirit to stir your heart and help you see through Mary’s eyes.

Question 1:

What stands out to you about Mary’s posture and expression as she walks behind Jesus? What might her gaze reveal about what she’s feeling or thinking?

Question 2:

Focus on the people following behind Mary. What do you imagine they think and feel as they walk this path?

Question 3:

What emotions do you think Mary experienced as she watched the crowd praise Jesus, knowing full well of his suffering to come?

Fun for the Family

Create a walk-through experience of the Triduum. On Holy Thursday, set a table with bread and juice, sharing a reflection on the Last Supper and service. On Good Friday, gather in a quiet space, reflect on the Cross, and pray together. On Holy Saturday, prepare by decorating with flowers or setting out Easter candles, anticipating the joy of the Resurrection. On Easter Sunday, celebrate with a family breakfast, recognizing the hope brought by the risen Christ.

The Cross Is Our Path to Victory

The Palm Sunday readings are the longest of the liturgical year, spanning Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem to his crucifixion. I found them painfully long as a kid, but now I see their length serves a purpose. This is the center of our faith.

God has a plan to bring us into his family as adopted children, sharing in his glory and the life of the Trinity. But this plan came at a cost more than two thousand years ago. Jesus paid the price for our sins, purchasing us with his life. He has claimed us as his own and has set us free. We are now his bride, and he is our bridegroom.

The Cross might seem foolish to people who do not understand, but to us, it is power—the power of transformation through love. It frees us from sin and unites us to a tremendous mystery. As St. Paul said, “I have been crucified with Christ, yet I live, no longer I, but Christ lives in me” (Galatians 2:20).

Isn't it fascinating that we call this public humiliation and death the “triumph of the Cross”? It is indeed a triumph over death, hell, and the grave. Even on the Cross, Jesus showed confidence in the victory to come, promising Paradise to the thief who believed.

I encourage you to pick up your cross and follow Jesus. As we die to ourselves and live for Christ, we will experience this victory. Like a seed in the ground, we must die to produce fruit. The difficulties you face are opportunities to join with Christ and experience victory, even in weakness.



Live the Gospel

Jeff Cavins says, “The Cross is a focus of our worship. I invite you to do two things this week. Arrive at Mass about fifteen minutes early, sit quietly, and ponder the cross that is displayed in your parish church. What does it mean to you? We all have crosses that we bear. Offer up one area of struggle in your life to unite yourself with Christ's sacrifice on Calvary on that Good Friday.”

Your Faith in Focus

THE LESSON OF ST. DISMAS

What does Jesus' suffering have to do with the suffering in my life?

The Passion can seem like just a story of distant events in the past. The truth is that Jesus' Cross is deeply connected to our own crosses. In an article about St. Dismas, "the good thief," Colin MacIver explains.

I Am Dismas and So Are You

When I thought about and prayed with the story of Dismas as told in Luke's Gospel, a meditation on suffering grew in my interior life. It seems that I have spent my life hanging next to Christ. The doom of suffering unto death, in its varying levels of intensity, is mine. Because of sin, it is what I deserve. At the risk of escalating this too quickly, I'll just go right for it and say this: My sentence is death. I am terminal. So much around me tries to distract, numb, and deny a fact that remains: I will suffer, and I will die.

When I fail to numb that reality away and breathe in the ache of my mortality, I am left with two paths. One is to curse God, mock Christ, and rail on in my bitterness until I am finally silenced by death, like Gestas (Gestas), "the bad thief." The other path is to look over at the bleeding and suffocating Christ beside me and to console his heart with an outcry of faith and repentance, like Dismas.

Crosses Change Everything

Scripture tells us nothing of the method of Dismas' crucifixion, but in my own meditative imagination, Dismas was nailed like Christ. In his final hours, as he pulled himself up by the nails to take a breath, he rose and fell on his cross in harmony with Christ. Dismas's wounds were conformed to those of Jesus, and the entire shape and meaning of his life was transformed.

I use this vision to sustain me in rough moments. When any given day is full of agony, I know that I do not hang on my cross alone, and I can turn my gaze to the one crucified next to me. I see that I deserve my cross, while he is innocent, and I can immediately perceive the way he is looking at me. His eyes are full of mercy. It changes everything.



Make It Your Own

Pray specifically with St. Luke's Passion narrative and put yourself in the place of St. Dismas. Write down what you want to say to Jesus crucified right next to you.

The Promise of Remembrance

Whether you are a daily Mass goer or do or deal drugs, whether you are suffering from a hangnail or a terminal illness, whether you are young or old, rich or poor—know this: You do not hang alone. If your cross is anxiety, unemployment, divorce, stress, poverty, chronic pain, or a slow internet connection ... you do not hang alone. Look next to you. Make eye contact with the one who is innocent and crucified. Rebuke the voices of complaint, bitterness, and despair and call on his mercy. I am Dismas and so are you. The whole lot of us face a terminal sentence. Nothing we buy, nothing we invent or do can keep us from our doom. We will all suffer, and we will all die, but this is not the last word; at least, it does not have to be.

Look into the eyes of Christ and pray this right now:

“Remember me when you come into your kingdom.”

Luke 23:42

Can you hear the response? It is a promise, sealed in blood and agony, that you will be remembered. Count on it.

- What are your current crosses, and how can you connect with Jesus' Passion in a particular way this Holy Week?
- How does your prayer life enter into a conversation with Jesus' crucifixion?
- What would you say to Jesus if you were hanging beside him?
